I have been working on the transcription of letters home from Joseph Ed Field, Jr. 1942 is completed and I'm looking forward to seeing the world through his eyes as he embarks on a four-year journey through the US and Europe. How does ones perspective change, coming from a smallish village on an island, to a continent in turmoil? We have recently jumped ahead in chronology to read the letters dated around D-Day and VE Day. It felt a bit like cheating but they were interesting to read. We have those up on our Facebook page. One room in the house has always been referred to as 'Ed's room' and has remained so. This is the room where we feature the items of Ed Field (1913-1983), from a child's feeding chair/potty training seat, his old baseball glove, his promotion papers, and Army regalia, to an old apron from Travis Hardware, where he worked from as a clerk after the war and later became president.

Recent Donations



Accepting donations into a historic home can be a tricky business, especially when you are lucky enough to have so many original items in the home.

However, over the last year we have been fortunate to have eraappropriate, local items donated and they are so lovely!

Our most recent items were donated by the Blakeslee family in the form of a lady's toiletry set, with a Moss Rose motif from the early 20th century.

The items belonged to a woman named Martha Blakeslee, née Green, from Nashville, who vacationed with her family in Rockledge in the late 1890s, where she met Albert Blakeslee. They later married in Nashville in 1908 and honeymooned in Rockledge. Their descendants still live in this area.

USDA Project

This has been a huge project and we would like to thank Chuck O'Rourke and Doug Ryan of the USDA, and local contractors, Thad Johnson and Wayne Crisafulli, for their expertise, guidance, and good nature. Grove Manager Darren, and his assistant Nemon, are working alongside the contractors to expedite the process. The next phase, excavating a pond, will be equally exciting. While working on clearing a ditch, the excavators rediscovered two artesian wells. One we knew of but could not locate. Water samples were taken and proved to be as salty as an existing pond. Upon advice and protocol, Brevard County and St. Johns Water Management were contacted.

STWM will be out to cap the wells free of charge.
